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
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



World Chess News

Rapid Chess World Cup by GM Mikhail Golubev

For the 4th straight year the ACP World Rapid Chess Cup is organised by the Pivdenny Bank and its cosponsors in Odessa, Ukraine. The only player who participated in all three previous tournaments, last year's winner Boris Gelfand, did not come this time. And the 2007 and 2008 winners, Peter Leko and Teimour Radjabov are also absent this year. 15 of 16 this year's participants already participated once or two times in the 2007-2009 Odessa ACP World Cups. And only Alexander Motylev is playing

The only real surprise of the day was Ivanchuk's loss to M. Gurevich. Ivanchuk looked tired after the Astrakhan FIDE GP tournament. The most interesting match was Shirov vs. Bacrot, while Jakovenko-Inarkiev (see our Annotated Game section) was undoubtedly the best game.

As an Odessa native I may be subjective, but in my opinion the first day of the ACP Rapid produced more interesting chess than the whole Astrakhan event. Of course, as the world champion Vishy Anand once said, 'good' chess and 'interesting' chess is not the same thing.

Round 2 (quarterfinals) and round 3 (semi-finals) will be on tomorrow.
