



After an extremely interesting round 8, Mamedyarov is leading alone. Truth be told, his victory over Wang Hao was the outcome of the latter's unforced mistakes – after the opening White had no advantage whatsoever. Shirov won his first game. His 15th move was quite impressive:

Karjakin's win over Kramnik is today's main annotated game.

15...hxg5!? is extremely dangerous for Black, even though it's not easy to prove White's advantage in analysis versus the computer. I prefer White, one way or another: 16.g4!? ♣g6 17.hxg5 ♣d7 18.♣d4 f6 19.gxf6 ♣xf6 20.g5 and so on.

Only a chess engine may suggest retreating the bishop to d7 or c8.
